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Assessment methods

A final passing grade (C) will be earned by meeting the standards for the course. To earn a B or an A, your writing will demonstrate a higher, richer, deeper level of understanding of the concepts taught.

Students may revise work to show achievement of the assignment's requirements, if they do so in a timely manner, and make all revisions in a different color type than the original assignment. Large numbers of assignments turned in at the end of the semester, and tests turned in at any time, may not be revised.

Turn in original work. Internet Academy teachers monitor for intentional deception through the use of an on-line subscription service and IA email archives.
