{ Course Description }

This semester of the beginning level Spanish course will introduce the student to a variety of areas of language learning. In this course, the student will learn listening, speaking, reading and writing skills through activities that are based on pedagogically proven methods of foreign language instruction.

The five units of material include: Familiar Objects and Places, Family, Food, Pastimes, School Objects and Routines.

Students learn to express themselves using an ever increasing vocabulary, present-tense verbs, articles, and adjectives. Grammar is introduced and practiced in innovative and interesting ways with a variety of learning styles in mind. Culture is sprinkled throughout the course in an attempt to help the learner focus on the Spanish speaking world and their culture, people, geographical locations and histories.

Course Materials:

Along with the required Internet access, you must have a working headphone/microphone in order to successfully submit the audio assignments and take part in the Elluminate sessions. Your computer must be configured to be able to record and send your voice recordings.

State Alignments

Standard 8: Connections - Students reinforce and further their knowledge of other disciplines such as history and geography through the world language and its cultures.

Standard 9: Comparisons - Students demonstrate understanding of the concept of culture and recognize distinctive viewpoints through comparisons of the cultures studied and their own.

Standard 10: Communities - Students use the language both within and beyond the classroom for a variety of purposes.

Course Outline

The five units of material include: Places, Family, Food, Activities, and School Activities.
